REFLECTION FROM DEACON STEVE URBAN

Isaiah 50:4-7 Philippians 2:6-11 Matthew 26:14-27:66

Recently I have been listening to some CD lectures on Lent, Holy Week, and Easter. The presenter Fr. John Baldovin, a Jesuit, is professor of historical and liturgical theology at Boston College School of Theology and Ministry. Fr. Baldwin says today's second reading is like a theme for the entire week of Holy Week. In this reading from Paul's letter to the Philippians, Paul quotes an ancient hymn in which Jesus emptied himself of his glory and took on our human flesh in the Incarnation. Jesus does not grasp at glory or take it by force like Adam and Eve did in the garden of Eden when they disobeyed God. Rather he surrenders himself. This self-gift of surrender reached its climax when Jesus died on the cross. Because of Jesus' total obedience to the Father, Jesus was exalted as Lord. This emptying in self-surrender was the pattern that Jesus gave us on Holy Thursday, especially on Good Friday, and was brought to completion on Holy Saturday and Easter Sunday. paradigm is what we are to follow in our daily lives if Holy Week and Easter are to have any lasting impact for us. As we journey through these Holy Week celebrations, we must not see them as events that merely happened in the past. Instead, we must participate in them as if they are happening anew in our lives and take on that attitude of Christ's obedience and self-surrender to God.

Today's first reading is from the prophet Isaiah and deals with the suffering that the prophet is enduring. Prophets throughout the Old Testament were persecuted and rejected because the words they spoke made their listeners un-The people responded out of fear and guilt comfortable. and often even put the prophets to death. Today's reading is called the third "Servant Song", and in the reading the prophet proclaims that his mission is to "speak to the weary a word that will rouse them". Each morning he listens to God's voice, and God's word does not disappoint him or leave him alone. His obedience and surrender, however, brings buffets and spitting from God's people. Like Jesus' self-giving attitude in the letter to the Philippians, the prophet always takes on this same posture of surrender even in the midst of ridicule and rejection.

Our Gospel today is the Passion according to the evangelist Matthew who probably was a Greek-speaking Christian. This writer wanted to portray to his readers that Jesus was the fulfillment of Old Testament prophecies and writ-Patricia Datchuck Sanchez, in her reflection on today's Passion, said that everything that happened in Jesus' life including the Passion was part of God's foreordained plan. Nothing happened by chance but was God's design. One example of Jesus being the fulfillment of the Old Testament is Jesus' agonizing cry on the cross of "My God, my God why have you forsaken me". This statement could be seen as Jesus despairing of the Father when in actuality Jesus was probably praying Psalm 22 from the Old Testament. In Psalm 22, the individual laments that God has forgotten his servant, but at the end of the psalm the person rejoices in confidence that God is faithful and always present.

Sunday, April 2, 2023 ~ Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord

As we enter into Holy Week, our reflection should lead us to see how Jesus, even in the midst of betrayal by his friends, doubt about his mission, and excruciating pain and suffering on the cross, surrendered himself to God's plan. Jesus gives us this example of obedience and self-emptying so that in all we do in life we might follow his way of holiness. This pattern brought Jesus to great glory from the Father and can bring us great joy and happiness if we follow in fidelity and trust. Like Jesus, we know that "Good Friday" and its passion is not the end, for there always follows resurrection and the new life of Easter Sunday.
