Act of the Apostles 10:34a, 37-43

Colossians 3: 1-4

John 20:1-9

"He saw and believed." This simple line attributed to the apostle John or the disciple whom Jesus loved is a powerful testament of faith. For the followers of Jesus did not in any way expect resurrection. They left Golgotha afraid and concerned for their own safety. With Jesus' death, all hope for him as savior was ended. It was all over. Yet, on the first day of the week, Mary of Magdala discovers the empty tomb and goes running to the two disciples...Simon Peter and the disciple whom Jesus loved. As they peered into the tomb and saw the burial cloths, their hearts were opened to the marvelous revelation that God had raised up Jesus from the dead. And they believed! How often in our lives, we come face to face with death, maybe the death of a dream, of an important relationship, someone we love dearly, and God shows us resurrection and new life. We must believe that our God never leaves us in death. Death is never the end because God raised Jesus and raises us also to new life. Are we not the disciple whom Jesus loved and is not our response the same as in today's reading, "He saw and believed."

Our first reading is taken from the Acts of the Apostles which we will read from each Sunday throughout the Easter season. Today's reading is Peter's speech on the occasion of Cornelius and his household being baptized into the Christian faith. It is a high-stylized, theological speech given not only to Cornelius and his household but all future readers of Acts. This event at Cornelius' house is symbolic of God's design, according to the evangelist Luke, to bring all peoples not just Jews to salvation. The story was about Cornelius' conversion, but it speaks about God's desire to bring all to salvation. And what was the message that Jesus came to bring? Peter succinctly describes it as this: Jesus was empowered by God to conquer evil and the devil. Jesus was crucified and died, but this was not the end. for God raised him up, and Peter and the apostolic witnesses are now sent to proclaim to all mankind the saving power God through Jesus has brought forgiveness of sins and life where there was death and sin. It is an occasion of great joy not only for Cornelius and his household but for us also.

In John's Gospel, this empty tomb scene is not one of joy but of fear. Mary of Magdala goes to the tomb by herself and sees that the stone has been removed. Again, not thinking that Jesus would be raised from the dead, Mary instead thinks someone has come and stolen the body. She hurries to tell Peter, the leader of the apostles, and the beloved disciple. They come running to the empty tomb and find the burial cloths but no sign of Jesus. But after discovering the empty tomb, the disciple whom Jesus loved is brought to the first glimmer of faith in Jesus' resurrection. Like this beloved disciple, we too need to start the journey of faith trusting in Jesus' power to save and restore to life that which had died.

So often when we think of resurrection, we think that only Jesus was raised up. But by his death and resurrection and the grace of our baptism, we too are raised up to new

life. It is not something we merely wait for until we die. God has freed us in this life and restored our hope. God wants to show us that in all areas of our life that we think are dead and hopeless, there can be and is resurrection and newness of life. But we have to believe and trust. We must be willing to let go of our hopelessness and fear and put our trust in God's power to do all things. Resurrection is the pattern in which we must follow Jesus. Let's start today on Easter and continue throughout our lives.

You can receive an indulgence on Divine Mercy Sunday if you take part in the Divine Mercy devotions held in church. We will be praying the Divine Mercy chaplet before Mass on Divine Mercy Sunday. There is the Divine Mercy Service at 3pm, at IHM Church. To receive the indulgence, you must also go to confession, go to communion and pray for the intentions of the Holy Father.

WHAT IS HUMAN TRAFFICKING? ...a modern-day form of slavery involving the buying and selling of persons; the fastest growing criminal industry in the world. It is based on recruiting, harboring, and transporting people for the purpose of exploitation.

There are multiple ways persons are used as products or merchandise, including:

- · Organ trafficking
- · Forced marriages
- · Mail order brides
- · Children as soldiers
- · Debt bondage

This multi-billion-dollar business is sustained by the GREED of traffickers and the PLEASURE of buyers. VICTIMS - Trafficking victims can be anyone. They can live in small towns or large cities; economically well off or poor. They may be US citizens or come from any country in the world. Victims are persons who are often deceived by grooming, a technique, used by pimps to establish a relationship, ultimately leading to exploiting persons for sex, labor, or ways of making money.

Most vulnerable:

- · Runaways
- · People living in poverty
- · Refugees who do not know our language
- · Children from dysfunctional families
- · People who identify as LGBTQ
- · Children in the foster and juvenile system

SPEAKER: Margaret Nacke, a Sister of St. Joseph of Concordia, KS., founded U S. Catholic Sisters Against Human Trafficking ten years ago, a faith-based national network that offers education, supports access to survivor services, and engages in advocacy to end modern-day slavery. Recently Sister received the Radical Abolitionist Award from the S.O.A.P. project (Save our Adolescents from Prostitution), a project committed to survivor-centered approach to ending human trafficking. Sister Nacke has educated the public about the way people are bought, sold and discarded as human beings.
