REFLECTION FROM DEACON STEVE URBAN

Isaiah 60:1-6
Ephesians 3:2-3a, 5-6
Matthew 2:1-12

A "gospel in miniature"! Scripture scholar Patricia Datchuck Sanchez, commenting on today's Gospel, says that even if you read no further than the second chapter of Matthew's Gospel you would still get the full impact of Matthew's message. The core message is that Jesus, Son of God, came to save all peoples, and the Church is to proclaim this "good news" until his second coming. As still another great scripture scholar Raymond E. Brown said about this passage, there is the twofold response to the Gospel message. He says, "some believed and came to worship the exalted Lord Jesus; others rejected the message and the preachers". On this feast of the Epiphany when God revealed himself to all peoples including the Gentiles, the question we must ask ourselves is are we the "light" witnessing to the world our belief in the message of Jesus. Are we willing to bow down as did the Magi and proclaim total allegiance and surrender to the newborn king?

Our first reading today is taken from the book of the prophet Isaiah near the end of this prophetic writing. The context of this reading is the people of Israel have returned to their homeland from captivity under the Babylonian rule. Jerusalem is in ruins, and people feel the despair of trying to rebuild their country and their lives. Isaiah is giving them a new vision...a new hope. For in God's plan, says Isaiah, God has brought them back to life and made them a "light" to all nations. God has manifested His presence to them, and all nations would come streaming to Israel bringing gifts fit for a king. For Isaiah, this had been accomplished by God's power in history through Cyrus the Persian who allowed the Israelites to return to their homeland from the Babylonian Captivity. While before there was darkness and the thick clouds of hopelessness and despair, now Israel was radiant and glorious because of God's redemption. Now God was restoring Israel and the world would be drawn to God through Israel. This epiphany of God's love came to completion in our Gospel in the person of Jesus and his mission for his Church.

In today's Gospel, we have the Gentiles, represented by the magi, who come to know God's presence through an encounter with the child Jesus. The magi, or astrologers from the East, were drawn by nature through the appearance of a star to the house of Jesus. Ironically, the chief priests and scribes, who interpreted the Scriptures for Herod, failed to recognize the coming of the Christ in the child Jesus. On the other hand, the magi, non-believers, came to realize who Jesus was and prostrated themselves before this newborn king. And like

the nations, in the first reading from Isaiah who brought gifts to the redeemed nation of Israel, these astrologers also came bearing gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. Gold and frankincense were gifts given to a king while myrrh was an omen of Jesus' death.

As we begin a new year, the choices are simple but demanding. Do we follow the path of Herod who represents the ways of the world and those who fail to believe? Or do we search diligently like the magi to find God in our world and become the "light" that shines in the darkness. In this feast of Epiphany, God has indeed brought us out of the captivity of sin and brokenness into the light of Jesus. God has brought us redemption and salvation by Jesus' life, death, and resurrection and wants us to continue to share the "good news" through His Church. Let's be light and gospel or "good news" to all the world throughout this coming year.

EPHANY BLESSING FOR YOUR HOME: Using chalk, write on the outside of your house or inside above the front main entrance, above or next to an entrance: +20 C M B 22+ (The letters C M B come from the traditional names for the three kings: Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar. It is also an abbreviation for "Christus Mansionem Benedicat" which means, "May Christ bless this dwelling!" The first and last numbers simply refer to the current year.) As you are writing the inscription, pray the following:

Lord God of heaven and earth, you revealed your only begotten Son to every nation by the guidance of a star. Bless this house and all who live here and all who visit. May we be blessed with health, kindness of heart, gentleness and the keeping of your law. Fill us with the light of Christ, that our love for each other may go out to all. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

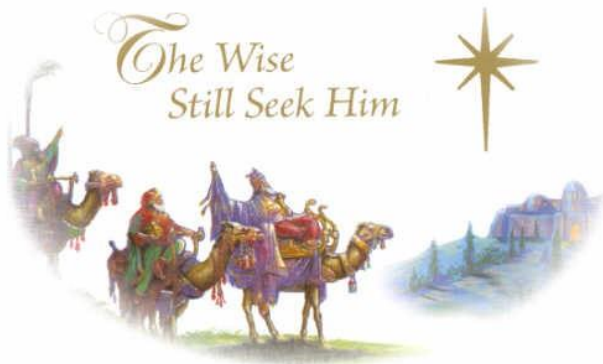
A Family Perspective ...by Bud Ozar
