REFLECTION FROM DEACON STEVE URBAN

Jeremiah 1:4-5, 17-19
 1 Corinthians 12:31-13:13
 Luke 4: 21-30

As I write this reflection, our country celebrates today the legacy of Martin Luther King, Jr. His life and his stance against the injustices found in our country capture the essence of both Jeremiah's message and Jesus' mission. In the first reading, Jeremiah receives his marching orders from God, and Jeremiah knows that the people of Judah will fight against him and reject his message. In a continuation from last Sunday's Gospel, Jesus does not perform any miraculous deeds in his hometown of Nazareth because of the people's lack of faith. Instead, Jesus is met with great hostility to the point of wanting to put him to death. Martin Luther King Jr., in speaking against racism and segregation, stood for freedom, equality, justice, and mostly love. Martin Luther King epitomizes what Jeremiah and Jesus proclaimed and stood for. And like Jesus, it cost him his life. We too must stand courageously and proclaim the Gospel knowing it will cost us a great deal. But like God spoke to Jeremiah, He speaks to us, "I am with you to deliver you".

Today's first reading is taken from the very first chapter of the book of Prophet Jeremiah. In this opening chapter, God calls and consecrates his prophet. God says, "Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, before you were born I dedicated you". Before Jeremiah came into existence, God was like a potter sculpting and molding him. God had a plan for Jeremiah to be his prophet, and so God consecrated him for this purpose. If you read the entirety of chapter one, you will see that Jeremiah protests that he is too young. But God doesn't take no for any excuse. He touches Jeremiah's mouth and places his spirit in Jeremiah. God also doesn't sugarcoat his message, for He tells Jeremiah that Judah's kings, princes, priests, and finally the people will reject God's plan. God gives his prophet hope and encouragement when he says that he will not abandon Jeremiah but will deliver him from all evil. God also promises us the same if we are faithful.

In the Gospel, Jesus has just finished reading from the prophet Isaiah. Jesus proclaims his mission of liberation and salvation. While the people seem to like what they hear from Jesus, they also know where he comes from. He is the son of Joseph, a hometown boy. They have heard of his miraculous deeds in Capernaum, and they want the same to be done in Nazareth. But Jesus doesn't do any miracles in his hometown because of their lack of faith. Instead, he proclaims that his message of hope and liberation will be given to all people, not just the Jewish people. That strikes a sour note in their hearts, and they react by striking to kill him. Like Jeremiah when the word of God is preached, it often results in rejection and persecution. This incident foreshadows what will eventually happen on the cross.

So, what can we take away from these readings? When

Jeremiah, Jesus, and Martin Luther King Jr. experienced persecution and pushback, they responded not with violence and anger but with non-violence and love. In today's second reading from Paul's letter to the Corinthians, Paul elevates love as the highest and most exceptional spiritual gift. Love of our enemies and those who hate is the core of Jesus' message and Martin Luther King's teachings. When we stand up in the world for the Christian message and its values, we will experience persecution and rejection. But if we are faithful to Jesus' message, we must respond courageously and fearlessly with great love. For love is the greatest of all!
