Nicholas saves the Innocent Soldiers

There is a picture of St. Nicholas in the office entrance at St. Nicholas Church. It is a picture of Nicholas stopping the execution of three soldiers.

This is the story of this picture:

Two men, Eudoxes and Simonides, had been taking advantage of a time of civil unrest to loot and steal from their neighbors. With suspicions closing in on them, they decided they needed a scapegoat. They found three innocent soldiers who were in the wrong place at the wrong time.

So, they turned those soldiers over to the Governor. And to make sure those soldiers were blamed for what Eudoxes and Simonides had done, they bribed the Governor with 200 pieces of gold.

When Nicholas heard of the arrest, he was suspicious. He knew the generals who were in command of the troops and that they insisted on good order from their soldiers. He also knew the Governor's reputation for corruption and his love of money. So, Nicholas decided to go speak to the Governor. While in route to speak to the Governor, Nicholas heard that the convicts had already been moved to "the place of the beheadings."

The concerned bishop ran to the execution site. He burst in to find the condemned men on their knees, hands tied behind their backs, and faces covered with linen cloths. The men had resigned themselves to their fate and had given themselves up for dead. Nicholas forced his way through the crowd, yanked the sword from the executioner, and threw it to the ground. He untied the prisoners' hands and set them free. Then he marched off to find the governor to chastise him for his miscarriage of justice-condemning innocent citizens without a proper trial.

Nicholas "broke down the door" to the Governor's Palace, demanding to see the governor. The Governor tried to suck up to Nicholas. He greeted Nicholas with deference and compliments. Bishop Nicholas was not amused; he stopped the governor in mid-sentence and accused him of being a "thief" and an "enemy of God," calling him "sacrilegious and bloodthirsty and unjust."

Nicholas got offended by the Governor's courtesy to him: "And you even dare to come before me, you who do not fear God! You who had the cruel intention to kill innocent people! Since you committed this kind of wickedness, I cannot have any respect for you. God is reserving for the unjust a tortured life. The most pious emperor knows your faults. He knows how your government works and how this province allows looting and killing men against the law and without trial for deadly greed and gain."

The Governor wilted under the assault. He fell to his knees and begged pardon. He admitted guilt but then added that two leading citizens, Eudoxius and Simonides, were the ones most to blame. "They made the accusations against the men," said the Governor. "Don't blame me."

Nicholas would not be fooled or distracted. "What did they pay you to do this atrocity?" Nicholas asked the Governor. The governor admitted he had accepted a bribe of two hundred pieces of gold before he arrested those soldiers. Nicholas told him, "It was not love of Justice, but love of money that made you commit these atrocities."

The soldiers were pardoned and released.

Eudoxious and Simonides, the two men who started it all. were arrested.

In the end, Nicholas prayed a long prayer and pardoned the guilty governor.

What does this story tell us about Nicholas? Nicholas defended the innocent. He freed the captives. He challenged the government when the government was doing something wrong. He also forgave those who had done wrong. With Saint Nicholas as your patron, know that St. Nicholas will fight for you.

Here is the difference between a saint and everyone else. When most people see something going wrong, they say "What a shame. Somebody ought to do something." When a saint sees something going wrong, they say, "What a shame. I'm going to do something."

That's what St. Nicholas did with those three innocent soldiers. We need to imitate the example of St. Nicholas.




Catechesis of the Good Shepherd came to the Hays Community this school year. The Sisters of the Immaculate Heart of Mary brought materials to set up an atrium for the Catholic school community. An atrium is a prepared environment for children and adults. in

which work and study spontaneously become meditation, contemplation, and prayer. It is like a retreat house that offers a space to ponder the meaning of Scripture and the Liturgy. The atrium is named after the entryway into the church building in the early Church, where new converts learned about Christ and the Christian faith. The atrium is a place in which the only Teacher is Christ; both children and adults place themselves in a listening stance before his Word and seek to penetrate the mystery of the liturgical celebration. Materials, which are handmade, are used to present a theme to the child, who is free to choose an activity that will make possible the inner dialogue with the "Interior Teacher." The atrium is a place for nurturing the religious life of children rather than a classroom for instruction. It is a place of meaningful work through which the child can have a conversation with God. 
