REFLECTION FROM DEACON STEVE URBAN

Isaiah 62:1-5
 1 Corinthians 12: 4-11
 John 2: 1-11

Many of you can remember the big German weddings of the past. These were day-long events that consisted of Mass mid-morning, a big festive meal at lunch, dancing and drinking throughout the afternoon, another meal for supper, and then dancing and partying until midnight or later. This nuptial celebration was an abundance of eating, drinking, dancing, and singing that involved lots of people, sometimes entire communities. This abundance, and sometimes overabundance, speaks to the first reading from Isaiah and the Gospel from John. In the first reading, God blesses his people with an abundance of mercy and grace after their returning from exile in Babylon. In the Gospel, Jesus reveals himself as the new wine of salvation and replaces the old laws of purification and ablution. Jesus is the new plenitude of the Father's love and mercy that supersedes anything in the old law. As we begin this new year, we need to turn to Jesus and experience in our lives the great wealth of his mercy and love.

The first reading today speaks of vindication and the reconciliation for God's people after they return to their homeland. Being in captivity for 70 years or so, the people return to their homeland and find it in ruins. Isaiah or Trito-Isaiah, the name given to the author of this section of the book, has the huge task of restoring hope to God's people. He uses three images to portray God's forgiveness and grace in bringing Israel out of captivity. First, he says Israel is now a diadem or a crown worn by a king. Next, he describes Israel's restored relationship to God as if she, Israel, were given a new name. No longer called "Forsaken" or "Desolate", now God speaks words of endearment and tenderness and calls Israel, "My Delight". Finally, Isaiah says God loves his people with the fidelity that a bride and groom have for each other. God is filled with passion and tenderness for his people.

The Gospel today for the Second Sunday of Ordinary time is not from Luke in which most of the readings will be for this liturgical year. Instead, we hear from the Gospel of John and the wonderful story of the wedding feast at Cana. There are lots of levels of meanings in this pericope, but the most important is that Jesus comes to supersede the old laws of purification with the new wine of his love revealed through his life, death, and resurrection. The clue to understanding this passage is the six stone jars which represent the old Jewish laws of purification. Jewish law required

Israelites to cleanse themselves before and after meals, and the water from these jars was for this specific purpose. Jesus replaces the old laws with the wine of himself. Jesus fills the jars to the brim with not water, but water now made wine. And each jar held 120 gallons of wine. Six jars each holding 120 gallons would truly be an extravagance, and that was the point John, the evangelist, wanted to make. Jesus' wine of self-giving was greater than anything ever seen. In the new nuptial banquet, Jesus was to be the abundance of goodness and love flowing from the Father.

As we begin this new year, God speaks to us through these readings and tells us of his great love. In Jesus' coming as a human person and taking on our human nature, God has married himself to us. God wants to give himself passionately to us. He calls us to great tenderness and fidelity. God wants to give himself in ways far beyond what we can imagine. He abundantly bestows himself and his grace on us, but we are afraid and reluctant to give in to his great love. If in the past we considered ourselves unworthy of his love, He wants to change all that by showing us how much he wants a relationship with us. His love is truly a fine wine that makes our lives meaningful and rich.
