My Stewardship Testimony Time

I will be sharing my own story of Stewardship, focusing particularly upon time, talent, and treasure respectively. This week, I will begin with the first element of Stewardship - time.

Time, regarding Stewardship, is specifically understood as time in prayer. This is the first part of Stewardship because it is the most important and most essential way we live as stewards.

Although prayer has always been a part of my life, I would strongly state that very little credit is due to myself. I would begin by giving most of the credit to my parents. I grew up in a normal Catholic home with an older brother and a younger sister. From as early as I can remember, prayer has been a part of our lives. Every night when we were little, my parents would come into our bedrooms before we turned out the lights to say our prayers. Normally it was something simple, like, "Dear God, thank you for this day. Please let me have a good day tomorrow. Please bless mommy and daddy, and grandma and grandpa, Chester (our dog), all our friends, and please let me have a pony. Amen." Then, as we got older, our parents entrusted us to say our prayers on our own. It was simple, but it very much instilled a habit. In fact, to this day, I find it very difficult to sleep at night if I have not done my prayers.

Mass is also something that was engrained in our regular routine. We attended Mass every week. My mother would wake us up at least an hour to an hour and a half early to get ready. She, herself, was often awake by 8:00 a.m. to make sure everyone was ready for 10:30 a.m. Mass. I do remember one time, however, in which our alarms didn't go off, and the family woke up shortly before 10:00 a.m. Initially we were a bit distressed that we wouldn't make it to Mass on time. However, my whole family went into panic mode, and we learned that, although we were not as presentable as usual, we still could all get around in 25 minutes if we had to.

When I finally left home and went to college, I attended Fort Hays State University. Here, I was quite fortunate, as on my first day I was invited to an event at the Comeau Catholic Campus Center. It was there that I met some of the best friends I have ever had in my life. I can easily say, without these friends to support me in my prayer, I do not know where I would be today. My friends were always the kind to encourage and support each other in going to Mass (often times daily), take part in Eucharistic Adoration, pray the Rosary and Chaplet of Divine Mercy, and all around continue to grow in the faith. Honestly, I give much credit to the foundation of my parents, and the continued support of my friends, for my eventually being able to know my call to the priesthood.

Of course, the seminary was full of prayer. It is odd, though, that through all this, I believe my greatest struggle with time in prayer didn't occur until I was ordained a priest.

I won't bore you with all the details, but let's just say that priests are often quite busy; in fact, priests often wish we were able to do more than what in reality can physically be done. Along with that, there are daily expectations of priests regard to prayer; in fact, some of these daily "expectations" are actually part of our promises at ordination. With this, it is a common temptation - with the work that needs to be done, and the inability to do it all,

something has to give. And the first thing to go is the easiest thing to let go – prayer! Unfortunately, the easiest thing to let go is also the most essential.

Many years ago, though, I was fortunate enough to have a very good spiritual director. As I was telling him my struggles, he told me, "Make sure you do not become so focused on the work of the Lord, that you forget the Lord of the work." Along with that, St. Francis de Sales once said, "Every Christian needs a half-hour of prayer each day, except when he is busy, then he needs an hour." I must admit, finding proper time for prayer can still be a challenge. Nonetheless, even though I always want to do the work of the Lord, I know that I can never truly and fully do this unless I am diligent in making time for the Lord of the work.

I suppose if I were to give some brief morals to this, I would state the following: 1) Family is where the prayer life begins. I will always be grateful for my family in giving me this foundation. 2) Prayer is not easy on one's own. I will always be grateful for my friends and fellow priests who continue to support me in this. 3) Prayer is most essential if we truly wish to follow the will of the Lord. *Especially* when days are full, times are difficult, and prayer is challenge, these are often the times in which we need prayer the most.

WHAT IS HUMAN TRAFFICKING? ...a modern-day form of slavery involving the buying and selling of persons; the fastest growing criminal industry in the world. It is based on recruiting, harboring, and transporting people for the purpose of exploitation.

There are multiple ways persons are used as products or merchandise, including:

- · Organ trafficking
- · Forced marriages
- · Mail order brides
- · Children as soldiers
- · Debt bondage

This multi-billion-dollar business is sustained by the GREED of traffickers and the PLEASURE of buyers. VICTIMS - Trafficking victims can be anyone. They can live in small towns or large cities; economically well off or poor. They may be US citizens or come from any country in the world. Victims are persons who are often deceived by grooming, a technique, used by pimps to establish a relationship, ultimately leading to exploiting persons for sex, labor, or ways of making money.

- · People living in poverty
- · Refugees who do not know our language
- · Children from dysfunctional families

Catholic Sisters Against Human Trafficking ten years ago, a faith-based national network that offers education, supports access to survivor services, and engages in advocacy to end modern-day slavery. Recently Sister received the Radical Abolitionist Award from the S.O.A.P. project (Save our Adolescents from Prostitution), a project committed to survivor-centered approach to ending human trafficking. Sister Nacke has educated the public about the way people are bought, sold and discarded as human beings.

NOVENA TO ST. ISIDORE THE FARMER FOR RAIN

<u>How to Pray the Novena</u>

Begin with the Sign of the Cross. Read the daily scripture verse (and spend a few moments meditating on it. Pray the daily novena prayer followed by the prayer in honor of St. Isidore and the <u>Our Father</u>, <u>Hail Mary</u>, and <u>Glory Be</u> **three times** for the intention of the Holy Father. Conclude with the Prayer for Rain and the Sign of the Cross.

Prayer in Honor of St. Isidore

O God, who taught Adam the simple art of tilling the soil, and who through Jesus Christ, the true vine, revealed Yourself the husbandman of our souls, deign, we pray, through the merits of Blessed Isidore, to instill into our hearts a horror of sin and a love of prayer, so that, working the soil in the sweat of our brow, we may enjoy eternal happiness in heaven. Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

Prayer for Rain

O God, in Whom we live and move, and have our being, grant us rain, in due abundance, that, being sufficiently helped with temporal, we may the more confidently seek after eternal gifts. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

FIRST DAY: PARTNERSHIP WITH GOD (Genesis 1:25 and 2:15)

Prayer: Grant, we beseech You, merciful Lord, through the intercession of Blessed Isidore, farmer and confessor, not to let us be vain with the wisdom of the world, but by his merits and example, let us in all humility always do what is pleasing to You. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

SECOND DAY: FAMILY LIFE IN CHRIST (Psalm 26:4-5)

Prayer: We offer the sacrifice of praise, O Lord, and humbly pray that through the intercession of the Blessed Virgin, Mother of God, and of St. Joseph, You may establish our families in peace and grace. Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

THIRD DAY: *LOVE OF NEIGHBOR* (Romans 12:9-12)

Prayer: Pour down Your blessing, we beseech You, O Lord, upon Your people, and upon all the fruits of the earth, so that when collected they may be mercifully distributed to the honor and glory of Your holy name. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

SEVENTH DAY: RURAL WORKS OF MERCY (Matthew 6:19-20)

Prayer: May the grace of the Holy Spirit, we beseech You, O Lord, enlighten our hearts, and refresh them abundantly with the sweetness of perfect charity. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

EIGHTH DAY: TRUST IN PRAYER (Philippians 4:4-7)

Prayer: O Lord Jesus Christ, Who has said: Ask and you shall receive, seek and you shall find, knock and it shall be opened unto you; grant, we beseech You, to us Your supplicants, the gift of Your most divine love, so that we may love You with our whole heart and in all our words and works, and never cease praising You. Who live and reign world without end. Amen.

NINTH DAY: SACRIFICE OF PRAISE (Hebrews 10:12-14)

Prayer: Protect us, O Lord, who offer holocausts to You, and sear our hearts with the flame of Your divine charity, so that they may be ever more fervently prepared for sacrifice. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.
